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CHAIRMAN ADOMEIT: Okay. This is the monthly meeting of the Connecticut State Employees Retirement Commission being held by Zoom technology.

Cindy, do you have the attendance, please? MS. CIESLAK: Good morning, everyone. is Cindy Cieslak. MR. CHISEM: Carl Chisem.

MS. CIESLAK: Oh, good morning, Carl. Carl Chisem, Trustee.

CHAIRMAN ADOMEIT: Okay, thank you. I'm going to defer to Sean Scanlon, the Comptroller. He wanted to make a few words. Go ahead.

MR. SCANLON: Thank you, Peter. Good morning, everybody. I apologize for being in the car, and I doubly apologize that I am currently driving up Route 8 in Litchfield County, and am unaware of at any moment whether my service will stay intact enough for me to talk to you all. But that's just how my schedule worked out today. I apologize.

But listen, I will be brief and just say,
thank you for all that you do on behalf of the retirees
and the work that you do. I think everyone on this
call is probably aware by now that shortly after taking
office in January, I formed a working group of both
labor and management to try and reform our CMERS
pension system.

John Herrington had let me know a few weeks

after taking office that you were once again going to have to send letters out to our municipal leaders telling them that their contribution rates were once again going up, and I think I surprised him and Charlotte, who joined the call, when I told them that I wanted to form a working group to try to address the issue, not next year or the year after, but to do it this legislative session.

And that was a bit ambitious, but I'm proud to say that we, as again, I think everyone on this call knows, were able to pass a bill this year that I do believe will be to significant savings and will lead to shoring up this pension fund, not just for those that are in it today, but for those that are in it in the future.

There were six main components of the agreement that we came to on the table. Carl Chisem was part of those six meetings that a couple of those items were actually passed in the legislature last week. Some of them are things that the retirement commission needs to be involved in, and then some of them are things that that working group will continue to do going forward when we begin meeting once again in a few weeks to look at hopefully creating another tier or a version 2.0, again, just as a way to make sure of

the sustainability and permanent viability of this plan.

So I can certainly go through the six points, as can John and Charlotte. But I think most of you are probably well versed enough with that that I think I can skip that and just open it up, Mr. Chairman, if that's okay with you, to see if anybody has any questions or comments, both for me or for our office, about this particular, you know, set of reforms.

The one thing I would just end on, Mr.

Chairman, and I think maybe the committee knows this,
but you and I spoke about this yesterday, we were not
able to bring some of those changes before you today,
but we do need them to be made soon. And so I think
that there will be a special meeting that needs to be
called, and I appreciate your willingness and the
commission's willingness to accommodate us on that so
that we can ensure that the municipalities can actually
start to see these savings sooner rather than later.

So with that, I'll stop and see if people have questions or comments.

CHAIRMAN ADOMEIT: Okay. Hearing none, Sean, thank you for coming and thank you for talking to us. We appreciate it.

MR. SCANLON: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. And

thank you, everybody. And talk to you all soon.

CHAIRMAN ADOMEIT: I take it that Sarah (sic)
Downes is not here today. Am I correct? Okay.

Division Director's Report, John Herrington.

MR. HERRINGTON: Yes. So I've circulated the report. As you can see, we continue to have historically low numbers in terms of the retirement activity, but that doesn't mean that we don't have work to do. We are getting caught up on our enrollments in the mandatory contributions piece. We are right now fielding questions regarding the shortfall contributions that will go in place starting next pay period for Tier IV members, and we've established the new shortfall contribution rates, but there probably will be some additional work as we implement that new change.

But I would say, with regards to the bulk of the work over the past week, most of our activities have been directed towards MERS and those MERS changes. There's a lot of work ahead of us. We have prepared a memo summarizing those changes, which I circulated last night. We've also updated the recently revised SPD to incorporate those MERS changes. So I would hope that the commission can accept those changes and we can post the SPD later this week.

And then beyond that, we need to work through the creation of a drop plan. We have to build that infrastructure that doesn't exist now, and we are going to definitely need to engage in a pretty substantial educational effort as we deal with individual MERS retirees, and I'll walk them through the impacts of these changes and help them plan accordingly.

So it certainly has been a busy month and there's a lot of work ahead. But in terms of us working through our existing backlogs, we've made a great deal of progress and expect to be, you know, essentially current with all of our work probably for the first time since I've been here, and maybe the first time, you know, in decades, by the end of the summer.

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                MR. RAYMOND: Good morning, members of the
     commission. My name is Justin Raymond. I'm here today
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     with my client, Sean Kilbride. This claim involves a
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     request for review of Mr. Kilbride's application for a
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     disability pension on merits. The application was
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     received by the Retirement Services Division August
     14^{th}, 2019 - I'm sorry, it was executed on 8/14/2019.
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     However, Mr. Kilbride separated from state service June
     30^{th} of 2016.
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                Mr. Kilbride is requesting that the
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application be received and reviewed for a decision on the merits on the basis that it is his position that he was under the impression that the application was going to be prepared and submitted within the two-year timeframe, however that was not done so at the time of his separation. Mr. Kilbride is here today as well as myself for any questions the commission may have to further clarify his position as well as this request that the application be received.

CHAIRMAN ADOMEIT: Okay. Thank you, Mr.

Raymond. Are there any comments or discussion or questions from members of the commission? What does the commission choose to do with this request, please?

MR. CAREY: Mr. Chairman, this is Mike Carey.

I was wondering if Attorney Raymond could expand a little bit on what the extenuating circumstances are.

I mean, the paper documents show that the material was submitted beyond the 24 months, but what are the extenuating circumstances by which Attorney Raymond believes we should toll the requirements?

MR. RAYMOND: Yes. And, Mr. Kilbride, feel free to chime in. I don't want to speak entirely for you, but it is my understanding that the understanding was at the time of his separation that the application was going to be prepared by the agency. He had a

workers' compensation claim involving his lumbar spine where he was receiving workers' compensation benefits at the time, and up through, I believe it was, sometime in 2017.

So it was his understanding at the time of separation that the disability retirement application was going to be prepared, however that was not done so. He followed up with the agency. Unfortunately, as the documentation shows, the application was not prepared and submitted until August of 2019.

Mr. Kilbride, I'll leave the floor to you if you have anything further to expand upon.

MR. KILBRIDE: (Inaudible) Sorry for not chiming in. My audio is a little weak on my end.

Yeah, so basically, when I separated from service, the woman that I was dealing with in workers' comp, I was under the impression that I had filed the correct paperwork for the disability retirement with her. However, from what I came to find out when I actually resubmitted the application was that I was really just filing my vested pension paperwork. I did not know that.

And, again, I had a lot going on at the time with the workers' comp claim as well as a lawsuit with the other party that I was involved in a car accident

with. And when I tried to follow up - I'm sorry, I can't remember the woman's name. She had a very different name, not very common, started with an M is all I can remember. When I tried to follow up with her, she still had an active voicemail, but I came to find out that she had retired and moved to Florida.

And I was leaving voice messages; I was trying to follow up. I called the main human resources and was told that somebody else had taken her position. This was, you know, several months to a year later. And during which time, my workers' comp claim had settled and I thought that would go retroactively into the disability. I got the name of somebody else I tried calling that I was told replaced this woman. Again, left multiple voicemails, never got a call back.

this replacement person had also retired. I believe her name was Dawn. And then I met up, you know, eventually with I believe her name was Denise and filled out the application. She said this was the first time she'd ever done one of these applications.

I had also called the Comptroller's Office prior to doing this and they told me about the 24-month limit, but because I was told that I was on workers' comp, I still fell - or the woman I spoke to at the

Comptroller's Office told me I still fell into that 24-month window because I was still collecting workers' comp, so technically I was still under the employment of the state, if that makes sense.

CHAIRMAN ADOMEIT: Thank you. How does the commission wish to proceed? Mr. Carey, you asked the question, so I'll call on you.

MR. CAREY: Well, I'm wondering if either

Attorney Raymond or Mr. Kilbride have information about

- well, Mr. Kilbride, with you just saying that you

continued to be employed, or you believed that you

continued to be employed by the state by virtue of your

continuing to receive workers' compensation benefits,

when did those benefits conclude; do you know?

MR. KILBRIDE: I want to say April 2017.

Maybe May. April, May 2017.

MR. CAREY: And do you know if there is anything in the employment record that shows that you actually remained on the state's active - in the state's record up until that time as an employee?

MR. KILBRIDE: Again, this was all due - over a phone call with - I wish I took better notes, and since then, I've moved and a lot of stuff has been lost - with an employee from the State Comptroller's Office. If her name was told to me, I'd probably remember it,

but I'm sorry, I can't think of it offhand. But she told me to go ahead and file the application because I was still within the 24-month window.

MR. CAREY: Well, then, Mr. Chairman, it would be my take, you know, for discussion among the trustees, that we should have the employment record explored and to take a look at the history of workers' compensation payments to determine whether or not that would have an impact on our decision in this matter.

So my recommendation would-

MR. LUCIANO: Generally, I would agree.

MR. KILBRIDE: But again, if I could reiterate, I really thought I submitted the application upon separation from service in the summer of 2016 with the party, but from what I understand - or came to find out later, that was just the vested pension paperwork.

MR. CAREY: Right, I understand that, Mr. Kilbride. The record, the document that we have in front of us, has that box checked off for vested rights retirement with your signature. So without something additional to talk to - that would demonstrate continued employment beyond that date, what we have on record is that box checked and your signature on that form showing that date.

So that's why my suggestion would be that we

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     do a little bit more digging before we render a
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     decision.
