Dear Governor Malloy:

I write to provide you with financial statements for the General Fund and the Transportation Fund through December 31, 2012.

OPM is currently projecting a Fiscal Year 2013 General Fund GAAP deficit of \$111.9 million and a shortfall of \$64.4 million on a budgetary accounting basis. Last month, after including the November rescissions and the impact of Public Act 12-1 of the December Special Session, OPM was estimating the General Fund to be in balance.

Since last month, new consensus projections have eroded revenue by a net \$33.9 million and deficiency requirements have increased by \$28.8 million. These two factors explain most of the change in OPM's projection this month.

I am in agreement with the January 15<sup>th</sup> consensus revenue forecast. The spending trend that I am using is \$75.6 million above the OPM estimate. The primary variance from OPM is within the Medicaid appropriations where case loads continue to exceed expectations. Therefore, I am projecting a General Fund deficit of \$140 million on a budgetary basis. The Transportation Fund is expected to close Fiscal Year 2013 with a balance of \$158.7 million, an improvement of \$11.9 million from last fiscal year.

The slow growth in the national economy has created increasing demand for state services while at the same time producing lower revenue collections. Traditionally, even after the national economy improves, there is a lag before the state budget realizes the full benefit of the general economic improvement.

The economy continues to recover at a slower pace than the original budget had forecast. The state lost 1,800 jobs in December. With the December data included, overall job growth turned negative with 100 payroll positions lost in 2012. Just under one quarter of the jobs lost to recession have been recovered to date. Connecticut's unemployment rate remains historically high at 8.6 percent; the national rate is also disappointing at 7.8 percent. According to the Bureau of Economic Analysis, personal income growth in Connecticut decelerated in the second half of 2012. Connecticut's personal income in the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter of 2012 advanced at a rate of 0.3 percent ranking the state 44<sup>th</sup> nationally. Housing sales in Connecticut have continued to post strong gains, but prices have been depressed.

As OPM has noted, less than one half of projected General Fund revenue for 2013 was collected as of December. April is a significant month for income tax collections, and recent federal tax changes combined with favorable market performance could result in a shift of capital gains revenue from future years to the current budget year. This would improve the present budget forecast. My office will continue to modify these projections based on actual experience.

I also issue a Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) that converts the budgetary based financial reporting to Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP). From a balance sheet perspective, the GAAP shortfall or unreserved fund balance in the General Fund was \$1.7 billion as of June 30, 2011. This was a small increase from 2010. The GAAP numbers for Fiscal Year 2012 will be provided in February. I am currently projecting a significant improvement in the General Fund GAAP balance.
